Judith Glick Buckman



After her pregnancy discrimination case with the Cherry Hill schools in 1971, Judy heard a NOW speaker and realized her situation hadn't been the problem—it was society that was broken and needed to be fixed (Gloria Steinem called this “the click”). Judy joined Philadelphia NOW then, in 1974, South Jersey NOW (“the Alice Paul chapter” part was added a few years later). One of her first activities was attending consciousness raising (CR) sessions which permanently changed her life.

Judy has been a member of South Jersey NOW for over 50 years. In 1978-1980, 1982, and since 2013, Judy has served as chapter president. After a few successful events, Judy was hooked on fundraising and continued to do that for the next 40 years. She has written the newsletter calendar; served on Budget, Nominating and By-Laws committees; mentors new leaders; organized bus trips to DC and has presented workshops at National NOW Conferences on Leadership Development, Increasing Chapter Activism and Alice Paul.

In 1984, Judy and other chapter members formed the Alice Paul committee (later the Alice Paul Centennial Foundation, now the Alice Paul Center for Gender Justice) to celebrate Alice's 100th Birthday, an event that Judy chaired. After serving on the APCF Board for 10 years, Judy started their Girls Leadership Program.

For many years, Judy hosted monthly Planning Meetings and newsletter mailings. She has collaborated with community groups including the Southern Burlington County NAACP and the League of Women Voters. She was the recipient of Planned Parenthood's Public Affairs Award, the Outstanding Woman of Burlington County Award, and the Alice Paul Equality Award.

On January 11, 2014, at a dinner to celebrate Alice Paul's birthday, Judy bemoaned the fact that the chapter had to spend so much time and effort doing fundraising. Barbara Irvine thought for a minute and came up with the solution saying, “We need a tax-deductible 501(c)(3) to raise money so the chapter can do its real work of grassroots women's rights activism!” The Judith Glick Buckman Fund for the Future was incorporated by the IRS in November 2014 and the rest is herstory.

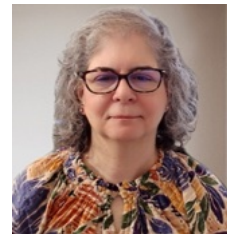

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Speaker



Uyen ("Winn") Khuong immigrated to the U.S. from Vietnam in 1980. She is the founder and the executive director of Action Together New Jersey (ATNJ). Most recently, Winn was honored for the New Jersey State Governor's Jefferson Awards in the Founder/Innovator category. For her organizing work, she was a recipient of the We Are EMILY Award from EMILY's List, and was also awarded the Community Service Award from the American Muslim Council. Winn currently serves on the Steering Committee of Rising Stars at the Eagleton Institute and former Governor Murphy's Diversity and Inclusivity Council.

Winn was a speaker at the 2018 and 2019 Women's March, and the 2018 March for Our Lives. Her media appearances and published work have appeared in outlets including *The New York Times*, WNYC Radio, PBS Newshour, *New Jersey Globe*, InsiderNJ, and NJ.com.

The *Philadelphia Inquirer* named Winn "N.J.'s current Alice Paul" due to her tireless organizing work. She is considered the patron saint of Vote by Mail having developed its maximum use throughout the state. She is also responsible for the widespread use of ballot drop boxes in every New Jersey county. Winn's latest project, *The New Jersey Civics Handbook*, is a guide to the voting process for teens and young adults, a group that votes at the lowest rate. Each year there are 20,000 newly registered 17-year-olds and Winn plans to mail the *Handbook* to each of them so they can get the civics lesson they didn't get in high school. The tattoo on Winn's left arm says it all: "She persisted."

The Alice Paul Center for Gender Justice (APC) educates and empowers girls and young women to view themselves as leaders, encourage civic engagement, preserve Paulsdale, and advocate for the passage of the ERA which, when enshrined in the U.S. Constitution, will give legal and lasting equal protections to people of all genders.

The Girls Leadership Council, sponsored by APC, is a space where female-identifying teens gather to discuss issues related to gender equity, build community, and develop their skills as advocates and leaders. They meet monthly from September to June, and participate in leadership projects, learning how to talk about themselves and the things they care about, and who to talk to about those things.

Fact Sheet

The Judith Glick Buckman Fund for the Future, Inc. (the "Fund") was incorporated in November 2014. The Fund is named after a woman who devoted more than 50 years of her life working for women's rights in southern New Jersey and beyond.

Its purpose is to educate the community about the importance of women's contributions to all segments of American society. It stresses the importance of the advancement of women's rights, full citizenship, and participation in all aspects of a democratic society. This includes public service, employment, education, athletics, family life, and volunteerism.

What Does the Fund Do?

The Fund raises and distributes money to assist with charitable activities and educational programs within our service area from Trenton to Cape May.

Past activities supported by the Fund Include:

- Provided cash awards to winners of annual essay contests for middle and high school students on topics related to the advancement of women's rights.
- Furnished honoraria to speakers on a broad range of topics, including women's entrepreneurship, girls and technology, women heroes of the civil rights movement, and an introduction to WOMEN'S WAY (a funder of organizations that provide social services to women and families throughout Philadelphia and southern New Jersey).
- Offered public programs on "Maintaining Healthcare Insurance Following Divorce", "Human Trafficking and How to Combat It" and many other topics.
- Supported films and videos about women in history including "*The Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire*" (which led to the development of unions and safe labor practices); "*Makers: Women Who Made America Parts 1-3*"; and "*Votes for Women*" (C-SPAN award-winning student documentary).
- Provided publicity for local Displaced Homemaker service organizations.
- Collaborated with the Southern Burlington County NAACP to hold three public "Conversations on Race in America".
- Sponsored seminars with the Burlington County League of Women Voters including "Why Aren't More Women in Politics?" as well as "Running and Winning" for high school girls to get them involved in the political process as voters, candidates or campaign officials. - Awarded scholarships and financial support for [Alice Paul Center for Gender Justice](#) leadership programs ("Lead-A-Way", APPLI, Girls Leadership Council), as well as AAUW/Stockton University's "[Tech Trek STEM camp](#)" to expose eighth-grade girls to science, technology, engineering and math careers.
- Supported Rutgers' [Center for American Women and Politics](#) (CAWP) programs, including their Ready to Run campaign trainings for college students.
